PRIME AREAS

PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Keeping safe – Rules and boundaries in the classroom.

Keeping safe on walks outside the classroom. – discuss boundaries, using the crocodile etc.

What makes me happy? Sad? Scared? Relating back to the Gruffalo story.

What does my mummy help me with? What can I try to do myself? – getting dressed

Talking about myself – what do I like and what do I not like? Who do I like and why?

Selecting and using activities and resources with help if needed that helps the children achieve a goal they have chosen or is suggested to them.

COMMUNICATION AND LANGUAGE

Speaking and listening games about positional language.

Listening to stories and small group conversations. Story telling the Gruffalo and other stories familiar to

the children using a variety of props.

Encourage your child to be as independent as possible, e.g. dressing, tidying up, toileting and washing hands.

HOW CAN YOU HELP AT HOME?

- In the mornings settle your child, then briefly say goodbye and leave the playground.
- 3) Encourage your child to listen carefully to instructions and respond quickly.
- 4) Sing songs, encourage your child to listen to environmental sounds, and talk about their day.
- Share books together; discuss the plot, characters and feelings. Encourage your child to talk in sentences about what they can see in the pictures.
- 6) Help your child recognise their name and label all their school resources, bag water bottle etc.

UNDERSTANDING THE WORLD

Leaning about themselves and their families. My family – who what, where, when? I am good at, I would like to learn how to... Favourite things ,Special places Make a map for the Gruffalo walk – compare this with what we see in our village. Nature walk. What can we see? Hear? Smell? Touch?

Introduce the words fact and information. Explore a 2023 range of non fiction books about woodland animals and seasons. Teach the vocabulary - Nocturnal, burrow, den, cub PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT EXPRESSIVE ARTS AND DESIGN Music- loud and soft. Big and little sounds, heavy and light Fine motor control activities, opportunities to use footsteps. scissors and a range of mark-making resources. Potato printing footprints aka Gruffalo, owl, fox etc. talking Activities to develop pincer grip, e.g. playdough and about colours and shapes tweezers. Focus upon correct pencil hold. Making and eating Gruffalo crumble. Gross motor movements and body awareness. Incy wincy spider activities. Health and self care, washing hands, toileting, getting Story puppets, singing, sequencing dressed, Singing nursery rhymes and other familiar songs.

Child-initiated activities will play a big part in your child's school day, but this will not be indicated in the topic web. This is often spontaneous learning and will be planned for in accordance to your child's ideas and interests.
