## PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Express my opinions and give reasons. Use correct tenses in talk. Use conjunctions in talk. Talk about our favourite books and familiar stories.

### PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Fine motor activities to improve pincer grip for pencil hold.

Gross motor skills – PE Hub- Organise and match items, images, colours and symbols. Work with a partner to listen and share ideas and questions. Collect, distinguish and differentiate colours and create a shape as a team.

# HOW CAN YOU HELP AT HOME?

- 1) Spend time with your child practising the phonemes learnt so far in their 'Phonics sheets'. It is really important to revisit the new digraphs/trigraphs as often as possible.
- 2) Continue to listen to your child read every day with, asking lots of comprehension questions to show their understanding of the story.
- 3) Encourage your child to write in different contexts, maybe they want to write the shopping list or a letter.
- 4) Continue to work on recognition of numbers to 10, different compositions of these numbers, ordering them and one more than and one less than.

Review common exception words/tricky words matched to the school's phonic programme (secure speeling).

Read and write simple phrases and sentences made up of words with known grapheme-phoneme correspondences and, where necessary, a few exception words.

Read and discuss a range of fairytales and familiar stories.

Write about our favourite parts of stories.

Create wanted posters to catch the 'Big Bad Wolf'.

Write speech bubbles about familiar characters
